## **GOALS INCLUDE:**


- Increase access to healthy, local food for children and families.
- Create a culture of health and wellness that extends beyond children to families, child care staff, and the wider community.
- Connect local farmers, especially farmers of color and female farmers, with child care sites.
- Examine and address the root causes of food and education systems inequities that lead to children's health disparities, which are disproportionately high in communities of color.
